RE: Glenwood (Overridge - Washtenaw): Results of Final Polling

Dear Resident or Property Owner,

Thank you for your interest in Traffic Calming on Glenwood Road. Following an initial questionnaire, orientation meeting, and on-site meeting, a final poll was conducted to determine support for traffic calming within the project area.

The program guidelines specify that, "greater than 50% of returned final polls must indicate support ('yes') for the final plan." This letter is to inform you that the results have been officially tallied and **the project** <u>has</u> received enough support to move forward. The breakdown of the final poll results are as follows:

- 31 Addresses in project area
- 10 Final poll responses received
- 7 Final polls supporting the final plan
- 70% Percent of final polls received support the final plan as shown

This project has met the required criteria to be considered for construction. The Transportation Commission will be asked to make a recommendation regarding the traffic calming installation on **December 16, 2020**; meeting begins at 7:00 p.m. and will be held electronically. Public comment time is available; access the meeting by dialing: 213-338-8477 or 888-788-0099 (Toll Free), Webinar ID: 915 9624 1857. City Council will be presented a resolution for action on **January 19, 2021**; meeting begins at 7:00 p.m. and is likely to be held electronically. If the Glenwood Traffic Calming Project is approved by City Council, construction is planned to be completed during the 2021 construction season. The outcome of the Transportation Commission and City Council meetings will be posted on the project website, a2gov.org/TrafficCalming.

You didn't have the courage to argue with the state to put a needed stop light at Washtenaw & Arlington. That would completely eliminate the problem. You are making a carnival ride out of a lovely neighborhood street. The only good idea was to reconfigure the stop sign at Glenwood and Overridge which would slow the traffic that comes accelerating around that curve heading towards Washtenaw. You don't see if you don't live here. The proposed solution is a disgusting joke.

I have never experienced any difficulty either as a pedestrian or motorist on Glenwood Rd and consider the plan to be an unneeded expense. I would also like to compliment the people involved in developing the plan for developing a clear and comprehensive plan.

In order to deter motorist from speeding from device # 5 to the complex and confusing (to northbound Platt motorists) and very large intersection at Washtenaw and Glenwood Road – Platt Road, an additional speed table should be added close to the Washtenaw intersection with Glenwood. It is around device # 5 when motorists see the red light and then try to speed to get through the light if they see it is green. Pedestrians, bicyclists and on-coming motorists traveling North on Platt and either proceeding straight across Washtenaw or turning left (west) have limited visibility coming up the hill on Platt toward Washtenaw and do not see motorists traveling South on Glenwood toward the Washtenaw intersection which is also uphill adding to the trouble of visibility.
